Oppenheimer

Oppenheimer has been hailed as director Christopher Nolan's magnum opus. An engrossing epic that takes you inside the tortured mind of an American scientist driven to change the world through the cataclysmic power of the atomic bomb he helped create.

With stunning visuals and a sharp script, this film has elicited a career-best performance from Cillian Murphy (of *Peaky Blinders* fame) and a potentially Oscarwinning one from Robert Downey Jr.



Based on Alasdair Gray's 1992 novel of the same name, this coming-of-age tale is from the same team who brought us *The Favourite*, a period dark comedy. Emma Stone plays Bella Baxter, the mysterious ward of a Victorian anatomist, who embarks on a sensual journey of self-discovery with louche lawyer, Duncan Wedderburn (played by Mark Ruffalo) as the pair travel across continents. Variously described as 'hilarious', 'wildly imaginative' and 'insanely enjoyable', *Poor Things* is a smart steampunk parable.

Takumi and his daughter live in an unspoiled village near Tokyo, but their idyll is threatened when a city company proposes buying up land nearby for a 'glamping' site for tourists. Much more than a simple portrayal of the clash between town and country, this is a subtitled film with hidden depths and beautiful cinematic moments reflecting on people's relationships with their environment and the need for balance.
